## **Course Description and Objectives**

This course will introduce you to studies of international relations. It will cover the basic concepts, theories, major actors and issues of IR. Therefore the course is not about "current affairs" of world politics although we will also discuss them as they relate to our subject matter.

The course will begin with a brief discussion of international system and its evolution in the last 500 years. Then we will spend about first half of the semester to cover basic concepts and theories of IR. In the second half of the course, we will cover substantial issues such as conflict, cooperation, use of force, terrorism, international law and organizations.

By the end of the course, you should be able to use different frameworks of analysis to explain relations of states and other actors and be familiar with most relevant issues in the field of IR.

### **Readings and Required Textbooks**

The assigned readings for each week are listed in the course schedule below. There is a reasonable amount of readings for each week. Therefore, please do keep up with the readings each week. This class will be far more rewarding for you if you do so. Reading the material every week will enable you to be more engaged while listening to lectures and contributing to discussions. Both your exam and participation grades will be positively affected by reading the material on a regular basis and prior to class.

There are two required textbooks. The second textbook is a debate book on most discussed issues in IR in recent years.

#### **Presentation**

Every Friday, we will use the last hour of this course to debate the issues from the *Taking Sides*. In this debate hour, groups of two or three students will make an introduction to the debate issue and summarize it. Then, the group members will ask questions to the class and manage the classroom debate that day. This will make up 10 percent of your grade.

## **Attendance and Participation**

Your progress in this class is highly dependent on your perfect attendance and participation. Participation means listening, reading the material before class, asking questions and answering them when asked. Participation constitutes a substantial part of your grade.

#### Make-up Policy

No make-up examinations will be granted without a university-approved excuse to miss a scheduled exam or quiz. In cases of severe illness or deaths in the family, I require proof (e.g. a signed doctor's note and an explanation on the doctor's letterhead describing why you cannot take the exam; obituaries; e-mails from your academic adviser explaining the specific situation). Also, I usually require a research paper as a replacement of a make-up exam.
