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Course Outline

This class will introduce you to game theory and its uses in international political studies. Game theory is a branch of applied mathematics that is used to analyze strategic interactions. Strategic interactions occur when choices made by two or more actors influence each others' outcomes. These kinds of situations are very common to political life, especially to international politics. In this class, you will be introduced to the basic tools of elementary non-cooperative game theory and learn how game theory is used to analyze strategic interactions among international actors.

Mathematical requirements of this class are not high and not beyond your abilities.

The assigned readings for each week are listed in the course schedule below. There is a reasonable amount of readings for each week. Therefore, please do keep up with the readings each week. This class will be far more rewarding for you if you do so. Reading the material every week will enable you to be more engaged while listening to lectures and contributing to discussions.
